







Regular vertical pattern giving rhythm and character to the whole complex

Horizontal divisions that align with the floor slabs of adjacent buildings







Alternating solids and voids resonate with surrounding urban fabric

Visual permeability between tree-lined boulevard and inner green court




### Frederiksberg Courthouse Copenhagen, Denmark 3XN

In a contemporary language, the new volume echoes the forms, colors and materials of the surrounding neighborhood

On the side overlooking a walkway the last two floors tilt back 45° creating an airy corridor from the square to the road system beyond the complex





### Studies of proposed volume distribution

The new volume yields to the shapes of the adjacent buildings matching them in size and proportion

The trapezoid footprint conforms to the perimeter of the allocated plot. One of the long sides runs parallel to the existing building and court, while one of the short sides faces the square in front of the courthouse complex and nearby church












Axonometric view of façade structure




















Cross-sectional view of natural ventilation and heating












#### 1- Rainwater collection

For irrigation and as heat exchanger to create microclimate in inner court



### 2- Direct daylighting

In office building, controlled with external brise soleil and internal blinds

# 3- Zenithal daylighting

Through different size skylights on office roof, controlled by actuating external brise soleil and internal blinds

# 4- Indirect daylighting

Rainwater collection pool reflects light indirectly into the production area



### 5- Heat exchanger

Water in the pool evaporates, creating microclimate in the court



Tall tree stand provides a natural barrier against cold north winds




#### 7- Green roof

Planted roof mimics the natural gradient, reduces thermal loss and increases building's thermal efficiency







#### Thatch roof

Locally grown and harvested thatch layered on top of the bamboo substructure (low cost, traditional and sustainable building solution)



#### Bamboo roof substructure

3 layers of bamboo sourced locally. Bamboo lashing technique from Japan (an exchange and cross-fertiliziation of traditional construction methods)


Formed on-site by local villagers, enhancing the participation of the local community


#### Water collection and reuse strategies


Curves and dips convey rainwater into:

- 2 collector channels
- 2 covered water tanks

Other channels spread around the courtyards draining rainwater from inner courts








### What's Kibera Hamlets?

Frame in colored tubes and timber planks. Infills and roof in corrugated polycarbonate, parapets in metal mesh.







### Architecture as a functional sculpture

Post-tensioned floor slabs in self-consolidating concrete alternate with clear glazing

A functional choice that allows the south façade to look like an artistic composition and be self-shaded, naturally illuminated and visible from the world outside

- Pleasing continuity of materials and colors between old and new, interiors and exteriors






